RC 21 Celebrates Its Annual Awards Luncheon

More than 120 members enjoyed the afternoon at RC21's Annual Awards Luncheon which was held at the West Sayville Country Club on June 17.

President Joan Perrini extended a warm welcome and quickly got the program started by introducing Florence McCue, NYSUT's newly elected At Large Retiree Director. Florence spoke briefly about her career in teaching which began in Yonkers and led to her serving on the Ex-

ecutive Board of the Yonkers Federation of Teachers and later as Secretary/Treasurer of the Labor Council in Westchester/Putnam.

Florence voiced her concerns for the future of education and the important role that retirees play in the process. She pointed out that while retiree members are 200,000 strong, they have disproportionate votes in NY-SUT. In contrast to the in-service(Continued on page 3)

instrumental in the restoration of the Brentwood one-room school house.

He introduced Gail Rogals and said that Gail had taught in Bay Shore for 33 ½ years. Despite her modesty she has accomplished much in her community during her retirement. In addition, every summer she vacations in Maine and volunteers for the Annual Lobster Festival. delegates who get to vote their entire membership, each retiree delegate to the RA has only 1 vote. It's clear that we do not have sufficient representation. We need to find ways to get more money for the retiree councils to help us energize more people. She closed with praise for RC21 as a premier council and wished more councils would follow their lead.

Next Joan asked for a moment of silence to remember Dorothy Zuckerman who passed away recently after a long illness. Dotty was a leader in the formation of the retiree councils and the first President of RC21.

Joan then reminded members to continue to pay dues to their chapters and RC21 so that they could continue to lobby with legislators on a state and national level. She encouraged them to increase their contributions to VOTE/COPE as she introduced the second speaker for the day, June Smith who is Suffolk County Vote/Cope Coordinator and



PAC Member.

June started by cautioning members to pay attention to the fact that private interests are investing lots of money to gain control of education in this state and in this country. Further, she said, in California the court is considering that tenure is unconstitutional and prevents kids from getting a fair education. It should be noted that tenure in California requires less time than New York and once tenured, it is more difficult to remove a teacher.

Another major concern here in New York State is the pending Educational Investment Tax Credit Act which states that if you make a donation to a private school you can get a credit of 75% on your taxes. NYSUT explains this as follows:

"The bill is a thinly disguised private voucher scheme that would divert hundreds of millions of dollars from the state budget at a time when 70 percent of districts are below 2008-09 state funding levels and public schools are coping with the loss of tens of thousands of educators' jobs, loss of vital instructional programs and increased class sizes." What is so baffling is that we don't have enough money now and yet we expect to reward people with tax deductions. Again, more evidence of interference from the private sector and we can be certain that only the wealthy will benefit.

On the campaign news, June spoke about Zephyr Teachout, representing the Working Families Party, in her bid for the Primary against Governor Cuomo. She is raising money and needs more than 15,000 signatures to get on the ballot. NY-SUT is not getting involved but we know that our members would be happy to put her on the ballot. Registered Democrats can sign a petition in her favor. Both speakers gave the group lots to think about.

After a delicious lunch, it was time for the awards. This year's recipients of The Community Service Award were Ellen Edelstein of Brentwood and Gail Rogals of Bay Shore who were each presented with individual plaques from NYSUT and RC21.

Next, the NYSUT Journalism Awards were presented by Joan. (See details on pages one and two.

Winners of the door prize and Chinese Auction were selected. Joan thanked the Benefits Committee and Louise Eiermann for the work that was done to produce the Awards Luncheon.

Joan reminded everyone to come out to let our state union know that although we are retired, we are very active, and to let our legislators know that we are aware of how they vote and will remember it when we vote.

Joan announced that the brunch to welcome new retirees will be held on October 28 at the West Lake Inn in Patchogue. New retirees can learn more about remaining active with their own retiree chapter and RC21.

She also reminded the crowd about the great events that RC21 will sponsor this year. On October 16, there will be a bus trip to the Essex Connecticut Steam Train and Boat Ride. From December 3-5 there is a bus trip to Woodloch Pines in Hawley, Pennsylvania. This trip will include an Olde Fashioned Holiday, a special dinner at the Heritage Night



Club and an optional casino trip and/ or shopping. More trips will be announced in the near future.

In closing, Joan encouraged everyone to vote for Tom DiNapoli, reminding them that Tom has always been an advocate for education and protects the teacher pension in favor of defined benefits pension. She thanked everyone for coming. It was an amazing afternoon.


