**What happened to Hillary Clinton on the way to the White House? By Phil Griffith**

If you read my CIRTA article during the Democratic primary, you know that I supported Bernie Sanders. I'm disappointed that Secretary Hillary Clinton lost and very angry that Donald Trump won. Hillary Clinton raised 700 million to Trump's 400 million dollars. Eleven hundred elite moneymen and women collected hundred and 113 million. She was endorsed by every major newspaper and some which never endorsed a Democrat. Former presidential candidate Mitt Romney made many remarks about Trump. "Dishonesty is Trump's hallmark." "His is not the temperament of a stable, thoughtful leader." "Think of Donald Trump's personal qualities, the bullying, the greed, the showing-off, the misogyny, the absurd third-grade theatrics." "Trump is a con man and a fake." "Here's what I know, Donald Trump is a phony, or fraud." How could Hillary Clinton lose to Donald Trump?

Something is rotten within the Democratic National Committee. In the 2008 and 2012 elections, the Rust Belt states voted for President Barack Obama and so did I. However in the last 6 Years, democrats hold 11 fewer U.S. Senate seats, 60 fewer house seats, 14 fewer governorships and 900 fewer state legislative seats. The Democrats control the governor and the state legislature in only four states. This poor record carried over into the 2016 presidential race. In the Democratic primary, Hillary Clinton barely beat an unknown Vermont socialist senator 2205 to 1846 in the popular vote. The undemocratic democratic national committee appointed 570 super delegates who voted for Clinton. The DNC effectively ignored Joe Biden and Elizabeth Warren completely.

In the general election, Secretary Clinton won the overall popular vote and yet was defeated 306 to 232 in the Electoral College. Prior to the election, polls showed her to be a favorite to win. The first female major party presidential candidate with 30 years governmental experience was opposed by a trash talking, no experience, one percenter who had little support from his own party, spent his own money, and was crucified by the major media. - 6. At the convention, mothers of African Americans killed by police however no relatives of police officers murdered in the line of duty. All lives matter. Hillary lost law and order argument.**
- 7. Bill Clinton's record of assaulting women. Hillary's attack of victims. This background neutralized Trump's behavior.**
- 8. Support for President Obama who advocated for common core, using test scores to evaluate teachers, and supporting charter schools. He delivered for Wall Street, banks, insurance companies, and 1% but not for the good paying jobs, jobs, jobs.**
- 9. lack of emphasis on the union movement and its support for Democrats. No disparagement of testing and charter schools.**
- 10. The Muslim mother and father of a soldier killed in action was admirable, however where was the mothers and fathers of Catholic, Jewish and Protestant soldiers killed in action?**
- 12. The discovery that the DNC member and CNN pundit Donna Brazile fed debate questions to Hillary. She was subsequently fired by CNN for cheating. 20. Brexit in Britain was fueled by same blue collar non college educated workers and should have sent a loud message to DNC.
21. Motion picture producer, Michael Moore's assessment of the rust belt was ignored. He was booed by Democrats.
22. Clinton's 30 years of status quo versus change. It worked for Obama in 2008.
23. Only once in the last 65 years was the same party elected for three consecutive terms.
24. Iran nuclear agreement opposed by Israel and supported by Clinton. Billions for Iran. Zero for industrial infrastructure in the U.S. and six trillion dollars spent on middle east wars.
25. The large premium increases in the health insurance for Affordable Health Care subscribers and the loss of their doctors as promised by Democratic president and party.
26. Adverse comments on twitter, Instagram, Google, Facebook and blogs about Clinton, democrats, DNC, and media hacking of DNC and John Podesta e-mails.
27. Lack of support from evangelicals and catholics due to the advocacy for gay marriage, late term abortion, separate bathrooms for transsexuals, and for challenging religious civil rights.

34. Trump's blunt, blustery, simple, frank opinions versus Clinton's bland, sensible, lengthy examination of complex problems and issues.

35. Anthony Weiner's computer containing Huma Abedin's emails and Comey's reopening investigation of Clinton.

36. Failure to energize youthful voters who supported Sanders.

37. Slogan "stronger together" should have been "Rebuild America" to support jobs, jobs, jobs.

38. The inclusion of multiculturalism appeared to exclude 80% white population. Emphasis on African-Americans, Muslims, Hispanics divided country.

44. At the fundraiser in New York, Hillary Clinton said, "To just be grossly generalistic, you can put half of Trump supporters into what I call the basket of deplorable's. Right? Racist, sexist, homophobic, xenophobic Islamophobic you name it." Such hate speech against Americans who disagree politically was a major

45. Sixteen experienced and well-financed republicans challenged Trump and lost. The DNC underestimated Trump and took too much for granted. They believed the polls.

46 The selection of Senator Tim Kane over Senator Bernie Sanders was crucial in the loss of young voters 18 to 30 and the Rust Belt blue collar workers. Majority of African American young voters under 30 favored Sanders in the democratic primary.

47. The Democratic campaigns lack of emphasizing traditional values namely family, hard work, religious faith (except Muslim), respect for law and order, love of country, and ethnic pride.

The defeat was devastating. We lost the presidency, the Senate, the house, and soon-to-be supreme court. The single loss will have adverse effect for years to come. My list of my reasons for losing so badly is subject to disagreement and more discussion. There must be analysis of the chosen candidate, Democratic National Committee, and the national union leadership. Were our tactics, strategies, and policies correct? I'm certain experts will examine the poor democratic record in the past six years. It is of little consequence that Clinton won the popular vote. Sour losing demonstrations will not help democrats. Symbolic safety pins will contribute little to the future success. It's time to begin rebuilding traditional democratic coalitions and working much harder on political grassroots action.

  7. Greater opportunity and support for the least amongst us especially rural areas and inner cities.
  8. Reverence, for religious differences.
  9. High quality education for all.
  10. Respect for LGBT community.
  12. Support for veterans especially the wounded.
  13. Protect the environment and jobs.
  14. Civil discussion of political differences and compromise for the benefit of our country.
  15. Appreciate work of private sector and public employees.
  16. Protect, Social Security and Medicare.
  17. The list goes on but not here.

We active and retired teachers enjoy a good life due CITA's advocacy on our behalf. However we are a segment of the labor movement and must continue to assist others to obtain a decent living standard. The election is over. The struggle goes on, "Keep the faith!" As labor hero Joe Hill said, "Don't mourn, organize."
