WHAT MY CELL PHONE'S GPS TOLD ME

The events of the last few weeks have caused me many a sleepless night. I am certain that I am not alone in this as many of you, no matter whom you voted for, also, are thinking and asking, "What's next?" Many answers appear to that question every day. I then ask myself other questions, like "What do I believe?" and "What do I do about what I believe?" as the realities of the election results take hold. I must admit that I was in shock as the outcome of the election became very clear. I had believed what seemed to be the inevitable, that our endorsed candidate would win. Of course, there was always that nagging feeling that she would not win, and so, she did not.

You will know what the title of my article means soon enough but first it is necessary for me to share with you my experiences while away on our recent vacation. Michael and I headed for Texas right after our Retiree Brunch. Our son, Michael, is stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas, which is in El Paso. He is attending Sgt. Major Academy and will only be there for the year. We saw his being there with his family as an opportunity to explore a part of the country where we had never been.

We first spent a week in San Antonio and it was love at first sight! Our hotel was one block from the Alamo in one direction and one block from the Riverwalk in another direction. Wherever we went, whether to the moving experience of the Alamo or the Missions, or the day trip to the humble LBJ homestead and then to his Ranch, or the wonderful celebrations of the Day of the Dead, (Dia de Muertos), or walking riding and dining on the Riverwalk, we were overcome with the beauty and history of this amazing

city. Everywhere we went we felt the graciousness of the citizens of the MANY cultures that helped create the essence of San Antonio. Every day became an eye-opening opportunity.

We then drove the 500-plus-miles from San Antonio to El Paso. I was very anxious since we had been warned to fill up the gas tank whenever we could and bring food and water, just in case! Michael teases me now because none of that was necessary but I will tell you that the entire distance encompasses ONE Congressional district. Thus, there is a scarcity of populated areas along that route (10) and there is a need to be prepared. Only when we arrived in El Paso did we discover that our rental car did not have a spare tire! Our adventure, however, enabled us to experience a landscape that was awesome in its vastness. Then, because of the geography of that part of Texas, as we got closer to El Paso, so did the border with Mexico. Eventually, we saw the Rio Grande and knew that Mexico was just on the other side. No fences or walls appeared when we first saw the river. In fact, if you looked to the other side of the river, you saw exactly what was on the US side: no difference. Both sides looked the same.

Our time in El Paso was wonderful. We loved our time with our son and his family. I always find life on a military base very interesting and sometimes unsettling, with jets taking off, military personnel, signs of a nation ever preparing to protect. El Paso itself is divided by the mountains and, on a ride through the mountains, I realized that they are as lovely in their barrenness as the mountains of the east are with their forests. When we set off to explore the city we discovered that the people were as gracious as in San Antonio, with the influences of the Mexican and

Mexican-American and Native American cultures strong, as in the city of San Antonio. I often thought to myself, without the people from these cultures, there would be no San Antonio or El Paso. Yet, each is as American a city as any other in our country: posters all over El Paso were advertising the weekend event at the convention center saying, "Feliz Navidad, Y'All". That is south Texas in one simple phrase!

With the background filled in I now get closer to explaining the reason for my title. There is a border crossing in El Paso into the Mexican city of Juarez. There are fences and walls there, and also for miles on either side of that crossing, with a strong border patrol presence. Two things happened while travelling near that crossing. First, as we were using my phone's GPS to direct us around the city, it suddenly started marking distance in kilometers. The second thing was that as we were returning from visiting several Missions in the area, the phone's GPS told us that the fastest way back to Fort Bliss was to make a left, cross into Mexico and then eventually return to Texas. No hoopla! The GPS did not detect a border change or people change or any change. The manmade border had no influence on the GPS. With a switch to kilometers, the border could have been anywhere. In fact, there were times in history when the border was fluid and followed the changes in the

course of the Rio Grande. Remember, too, that both sides of the river look the same.

So, what does my story or my GPS's findings have to do with the questions posed at the beginning of my story? As I reflected on what the cities and the GPS had to offer, my thoughts about the future of our country began to crystalize. The visit to both cities moved me greatly. As a result of that visit, it now is ever more evident that divisions are often man-made and, because of that, we should be discerning as to whom we allow to promote those divisions. If the election appears to have left us a divided nation, we need to ask who created that division and should we give that person or people the power to make us even more divided? This has always been a great country where our disagreements can be aired without fear of reprisal. So, I have decided, shedding the malaise I experienced after the election, to continue to make certain that this continues to be so. Believe please that we still have the power to give power or to take it away. Let us be energized as we continue to work TOGETHER for our common good, our future.
